There is ***even more***



Easter Book Bingo Challenge



Write a new blurb for the back of one of your books.	What was the best bit of one of your books? Draw a picture to show it.	Design a new cover for a book – how will you make it look different?	Using pictures, show how a non-fiction text is set out.	Read a comic or magazine. Draw your favourite part.
Think of two questions you would like to find the answer to in a non-fiction book. Read the book to find the answers.	Read part of your book to a friend, putting in as much expression as you can. Get them to write in your reading diary.	Write down any new words you have read. Use a dictionary to find out the meaning of the words and record it.	Read your book in an unusual place and take a photo!	Draw a mind map of everything you have found out in a non-fiction book.
Read something that came in the mail.	Write a list of features you can find in a non-fiction book. E.g. contents page.		Share read a book with an adult at home. Who can use the most expression?	Write a book review to persuade someone else to read your book.
Read and read a poem until you can remember every word!	Copy out two sentences or phrases from a book that you really like. Say why you like them.	In two sentences, write down the main event in a recent book you have read.	Draw your favourite character from a story. Use adjectives to describe.	Read a recipe and have a go at making it!
Read at least 10 times during the holiday and ask an adult to mark each read in your diary.	Read your book in an unusual place and take a photo!	Write down each time you need to use your reading skills when out with your family. How many times did you read?	Read a book that you used to enjoy when you were younger. Why did you enjoy it?	Read a poem and draw a picture of how it makes you feel.

Retell a story to an adult. What happened in the beginning, middle and end of the story?	Read a book under your bed covers - have you got a torch?	Design a new cover for a book – how will you make it look different?	Read your book in an unusual place and take a photo!	Read a non-fiction book. Draw or write about an amazing fact you have found out.
Read a shopping list. Can you add anything else to the shopping list?	Read a favourite book with an adult. Can you think of a different ending to the story? Draw a picture to show what happens.		Share read a book with an adult at home. Who can use the most expression?	Write a book review. What did you like about the book? How many stars will you give your book?
Read and read a poem until you can remember every word!	Use a contents page in a non-fiction book to help you choose what you will read about next. What did you find out?	Ask an adult to read one of their favourite books from when they were younger to you.	Draw your favourite character from a story. How would you describe your character?	Read a recipe and have a go at making it!
Read at least 10 times during the holiday and ask an adult to mark each read in your diary.	Read your book in an unusual place and take a photo!	Read as many signs as you can when you are out and about this Easter holiday.	Read a book that you used to enjoy when you were younger. Why did you enjoy it?	Read a rhyming poem. Can you find the rhyming words? Can you think of any more words that rhyme?
